These aren't just technical glitches - they impact livelihoods, building integrity, and public confidence.

At Sheriff Construction, we take this seriously.

Our defect rate across all projects stands at just 0.005%, reflecting a culture of precision and accountability. We are also frequently called in to remedy work left unfinished or improperly done by others - a clear reflection of both the market's challenges and our reputation for reliability.

Raising the bar in an era of regulation and responsibility

The Building Safety Act and the introduction of the Building Safety Regulator have ushered in a new era of construction governance. Projects must now meet stricter pre-construction evidence requirements, with every component - including roofing - assessed and signed off before work even begins. This means that:

- Every detail must be traceable and backed by documentation.
- Installers must prove that materials and methods meet national standards.
- Clients, inspectors, and warranty providers require rigorous transparency across the whole build, seeking assurances that works have been installed to a high standard.

These regulations are not optional. They are reshaping how construction firms must operate - and rightly so.

Quality assurance is no longer a 'nice to have' trait. It's a core obligation.

Skilled people and proven credentials

- We operate under a comprehensive Quality Management Procedure, guiding everything we do on-site and behind the scenes.
- Sheriff Construction is a proud member of the National Federation of Roofing Contractors (NFRC) and holds accreditations from SMAS, CHAS, Constuctionline and CQMS.
- Our team is approved to install systems from top manufacturers, including IKO, SIKA, Axter and Bauder.
- We run an ongoing training and development programme for all teams - including First Aid and installation training for site staff, IOSH management courses for managers, and training on pricing and technical specifications for office staff.

Rigorous assessment and transparent reporting

- We work with an independent Health & Safety organisation to audit our operations regularly.
- Every project is supported by a detailed Quality Management Report, outlining how we meet performance and safety standards.
- Quality is closely monitored at every stage of works. Contracts Managers and Site Supervisors document progress, while Roofing Manufacturers independently assess and sign off on key elements.
- Upon completion, clients receive a comprehensive Operations & Maintenance manual with specifications, datasheets, test results, contact details and a warranty of up to 30 years.

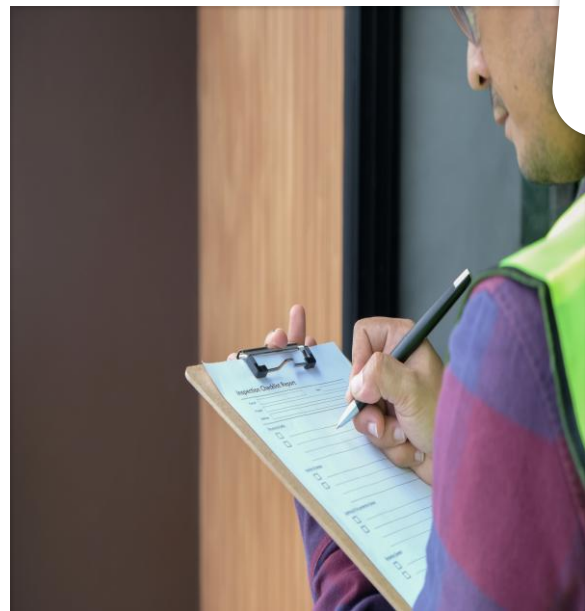
